**Marshall University Oral Argument Session:** Oral arguments will be held at [The Joan C. Edwards Performing Arts Center](#), 1655 5th Avenue, Huntington, WV 25755, beginning at 9:30 a.m. Parking is available in the adjacent parking garage for a small hourly fee (CASH ONLY).

The argument session is open to the public. All attendees must have a picture ID and will be screened for prohibited items before entering the auditorium. The following items are prohibited: weapons, potential weapons, flammable materials, electronic devices (cell phones, smart watches, cameras, recording devices), bags (backpacks, purses, briefcases), food, drinks hats (except for religious purposes). Presenting attorneys are authorized to bring such items as are needed for presentation of their case. Cameras are authorized for media representatives who have prior approval from the University to take photographs during the Q&A session following argument only. Other photography or recording is not permitted.

Forty minutes of argument time are allotted for each case. Attendees are asked to enter and exit the auditorium between cases rather than during argument.
